Dyslexia Specialist Certificate (30 credits)

The Dyslexia Specialist Certificate is a program tailored for general education classroom teachers and teachers of special education who wish to develop comprehensive knowledge and extensive experience in the Orton Gillingham approach to teaching reading, spelling and handwriting. The program provides courses on theory and practice required for effective educational intervention for struggling readers including students with dyslexia.

The Orton Gillingham Dyslexia Specialist Training Course provides a continuum of programs for teachers who want to develop beginning to advanced expertise in the Orton Gillingham approach or who wish to become teacher trainers. These programs are nationally accredited by the International Multisensory Structured Language Education Council (IMSLEC), which provides national accreditation to programs that prepare specialists in multisensory structured language education.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

EDUC 6601 Multisensory Reading 1

3 credits

An introduction to teaching beginning reading, spelling and handwriting (up to fourth-grade level), focusing on the Orton Gillingham approach to teaching basic language skills. Teachers plan, present and evaluate instructional sequences for students with dyslexia. Consists of lecture followed by a supervised practicum in which teachers provide individual Orton Gillingham-based instruction to students with dyslexia. Also includes group seminars and individual conferences between teacher and practicum supervisor.

EDUC 6602 Multisensory Reading 2

3 credits

A continuation of training in the Orton Gillingham techniques taught in Multisensory Reading 1 (EDUC 6601). Includes testing procedures and data collection to evaluate student growth and effectiveness of instructional approach. Consists of lecture, supervised practicum, group seminars, and individual conferences. Prerequisite: EDUC 6601.

History of Multisensory Instructional EDUC 6610 **Methods for Students with Learning** Disabilities/Dyslexia

1 credit

A historical perspective of multisensory teaching techniques in the areas of reading, spelling and writing. Various curricula are compared and contrasted.

EDUC 6616 Language Acquisition and **Language Disorders**

3 credits

An introduction to language development. The relationships of oral language to written language, the identification of language disability and language-based approaches to the remediation of literacy deficits are explored.

Neurophysiological Basis of EDUC 6626 **Learning Problems**

3 credits

Introduction to anatomy and physiology of the human nervous system. Emphasis on semimotor and higher order functions and dysfunctions basic to understanding school learning problems and the effects of handicapping conditions on the atypical learner.

EDUC 6743 Introduction to Students with **Disabilities in School and Community** 3 credits

Introduction to the student with disabilities. Overview of normal growth and development as a basis to identify developmental delays and learning differences. Characteristics of different disabilities and their effects on how children learn. Review of federal, state and local regulations and their effect on local policies, procedures and placement. Transition planning, resources and assistive technology to enhance the performance of students with disabilities.

EDUC 6746 Learning Environment and Effective **Management of Teaching and Learning**

Review of psychological, social and emotional characteristics of individuals with learning disabilities. Exploration of teacher attitudes and behaviors that influence behavior of students with diverse learning needs. Classroom management theories and strategies for individuals with learning disabilities. Collection and interpretation of performance data to develop behavior management plans for individuals with learning disabilities.

EDUC 7603 Multisensory Reading 3 3 credits

Focuses on skills for teaching upper-level language skills (fourth grade level and above) involved in reading, spelling, and handwriting, using the Orton Gillingham approach. Topics include alphabetic orthography involving roots, prefixes and suffixes. Consists of lecture followed by a supervised practicum in which teachers are assigned upper level students with dyslexia. Group seminars and individual conferences between teacher and supervisor also are included.

EDUC 7604 Multisensory Reading 4

3 credits

A continuation of the training techniques in the Orton Gillingham techniques taught in EDUC 7603 with continued study of upper-level language skills. Consists of lecture, supervised practicum, group seminars, and individual conferences between teacher and supervisor, as described for EDUC 7603.

EDUC 7620 Diagnosis of Dyslexia

2 credits

Diagnosis of individuals with dyslexia, including current research and best practices. Case studies, hands-on practice with frequently used tests, and test profiles of students with dyslexia.

Prerequisite: EDUC 6602

EDUC 8609 Multisensory Reading 5

3 credits

Techniques for teacher training and supervision of the Orton Gillingham approach to instruction are offered. Students plan, present and evaluate training sessions. Includes supervision in providing instruction and feedback to individuals in training. Prerequisites: Multisensory Reading 1 through 4.

EDUC 8610 Multisensory Reading 6

3 credits

Continuation of Multisensory Reading V. Students are supervised in training teachers in Orton Gillingham approach to reading instruction. Prerequisites: Multisensory 1 through 5.

EDUC 8612 Advanced Orton Gillingham Practicum 1 3 credits

Focuses on provision of comprehensive instruction, including decoding, encoding, written expression, reading comprehension, and study skills using multisensory strategies. Consists primarily of a supervised practicum working with students with dyslexia.

EDUC 8613 Advanced Orton Gillingham Practicum 2

A continuation of the training provided in EDUC 8612 and includes training in syntax and written expression instruction. Consists of lectures and a supervised practicum working with students with dyslexia.

EDUC 8614 **Orton Gillingham Internship**

3 credits

Applied field experience in private practice, schools or clinical settings to meet hours required for the Orton Gillingham Therapist Certificate. Instruction using the Orton Gillingham approach is tailored to the individual/group and includes decoding, encoding, fluency, handwriting, vocabulary, comprehension, narrative and expository writing. The course includes 10 of the observations required for certification at the therapy level.
