

WRITING CENTRE

Verb tenses are commonly used to clarify time relationships such as: past, present, future, perfect, and continuous. They can also work as a combination of two or three tenses and are typically used in conjunction with the following pronouns:

> you (plural) you he/she/it

Note that **simple tenses** are the most common and portray either something that is a habit or regular activity; continuous tenses indicate something that occurs continuously for a particular period of time and perfect tenses show things that occur at an unregulated period of time or the relationship between two different events that occurred at different times.

PRESENT TENSES:

Subject + Verb

Simple present

Present continuous

Present perfect

Present perfect continuous

... verb(s)

... am/is/are + present participle

... have/has + past participle

... have/has + **been** + present participle

Examples

I listen. He cooks. I am listening. He is cooking. I have listened. He has cooked. I have been listening.

He has been cooking.

PAST TENSES:

Simple past

Past continuous

Past perfect

Past perfect continuous

Subject + Verb

... verb+ed (except for verbs with irregular forms)

... was/were + verb+ing

... had + past participle

... had + been + verb+ing

Examples

You spoke. It played. You were speaking. It was playing. You had spoken. It had played. You had been speaking. It had been playing.

FUTURE TENSES:

Subject + Verb

Simple future ... will + base verb

Future continuous ... will be + present participle

Future perfect ... will **have** + past participle

Future continuous perfect ... will + have + been + present participle

Examples

You will read.
They will stay.
You will be reading.
They will be staying.
You will have read.
They will have stayed.
You will have been reading.
They will have been staying.
