Kara Alaimo

Dr. Alaimo is Associate Professor of Communication at Fairleigh Dickinson University, where she created the university's academic programs in social media. Her book Over the Influence: Why Social Media is Toxic for Women and Girls – And How We Can Take It Back (Alcove, 2024) explains how social media is affecting every aspect of the lives of women and girls and what we can do about it. She has been writing opinion and analysis pieces for CNN about the social impact of social media since 2016. She is also a former communicator at the United Nations and in the Obama administration. She also previously served as the first Press Secretary of the Peter G. Peterson Foundation, Global Media Coordinator for the United Nations Millennium Campaign, and as a spokesperson for New York City economic development initiatives during the administration of Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg.

Dr. Alaimo earned her Doctor of Philosophy, Master of Philosophy, and Masters of Arts degrees at the City University of New York, and her Bachelor of Arts in Journalism with a minor in Women's Studies at N.Y.U.

Department at FDU. Dr. Caldiero's work has appeared in the Journal of Public Relations
Research and the American Communication Journal. He has authored or co-authored four
"Top Paper" articles from the National Communication Association. As an expert in Public
Relations and Crisis Management, he teaches several classes on these topics at FDU.

Noah Epstein has been an adjunct professor at Fairleigh Dickinson University since 2011, where he has developed and teaches three college courses: History of Photography, Inside
